SECRET SERVICE AGENTS HELP REAGAN INTO HIS LIMOUSINE AFTER HE WAS SHOT.

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Reagan was shot in the left chest in an assassination attempt and underwent emergency sur-gery Monday (Tuesday, Far East

He came out of the surgery well and hospital officials said at no time was he in serious danger.

Reagan's press secretary,

Secret Service agent and policeman were also shot as the gunman virtually emptied his

.22-caliber pistol at 2:30 p.m. outside a Washington hotel. The press secretary, James S. Brady, was critically wounded.

The president was treated at George Washington University Hospital. Secretary of State Alexander M. Haig Jr. said the chief executive had been shot in the left lung and was taken to surgery.

After an hour of surgery, doctors told first lady Nancy Reagan the president's condition

was "good," said top aide Lyn Nofziger.

A SUSPECT, a 22-year-old Colo-

rado man, was arrested immediately after the shooting.

Earlier, Nofziger told reporters, "The bullet did not hit the heart."
