Quits 'Against His Instinct'; Ford Set to Assume Office

WASHINGTON — Richard M. Nixon said Thursday night that although it is "abhorrent to every instinct in my body," he has decided to resign and relinquish the presidency of the United States to Vice President Gerald R. Ford because he no longer has the support of the Congress.

Nixon thus became the first president to resign his office in the history of the United States.

In a speech broadcast on nationwide television and radio, Nixon said that he normally would have felt it his duty to complete his term and continue the work he has started. But because of the threat of impeachment, he said, "I no longer have a strong enough political base in the Congress to justify continuing that effort."

Ford Calls Move A Great Sacrific

ALEXANDRIA, Va. (AP) — Gerald R. Ford said Thursday night that President Nixon "made one of the greatest per-sonal sacrifices for the coun-try" by resigning as President. Appearing outside him

Appearing outside his home shortly after Nixon's announcement, Ford said he plans to continue Nixon's foreign policies with Henry A. Kissinger remaining as secretary of remaining as state.

"I want him to be my secre-tary of state and I'm glad to announce he will be secretary of state," said the man who at

Ford said he expects "a spirit of cooperation between the new President and the Congress."
